

# Traveler's Joy (Clematis vitalba) or Old Man's Beard

# Clackamas River Basin Council


### **Characteristics**

- Vine plant that twists around trees, shrubs, and fences.
- They can grow up to 100 ft and can be as thick as 60 inches in diameter.
- Common in urban and residential areas, but is quickly spreading to wooded areas.
- Aggressive climber

- During Summer months, this invasive plant sprouts white or pale yellow flowers.
- · In Winter, it has feathery white seed heads.
- · Leaves are arranged in five leaflets surrounding the bud.
- · Spreads by the wind blowing the seed pods.

# Introduction and Distribution

- Native to most of Europe (North to central England), South Western Asia, and Africa.
- Invaded not only the United States, but Canada, and Poland, and New Zealand as well in the 1920's.
- Has now spread across British Columbia, Ontario, down through Washington, Oregon, and California, and has even cropped up in Maryland and Maine.



 There are many other varieties of the Clematis plant and most are noninvasive, but Traveler's Joy in just as dangerous to the environment as English Ivy.

# **Environmental Concerns and Prevention**

- Starves trees and bushes of sunlight.
- Creates dense mats of vegetation on the ground, preventing new plant growth.

#### To control:

- If growing on trees, cut and remove all vines around the trunk.
- If on the ground, manual pulling or digging out the plant and dispose with yard waste.
- Using herbicide is optional. For more information, contact the Clackamas River Basin Council.
